

This half term in school we have been thinking about our school value of Truthfulness.

We wish all our children a fantastic holiday time and look forward to another productive term in January.


RECEPTION—MCKEE

Reception have been working hard and having fun this term!



We have used a range of texts which the children have enjoyed using as a stimulus to their learning. Some of the children's favourites have included 'Gruffalo's Child', 'Pattan's Pumpkin' and 'Room on the Broom'. The children have also explored a range of non fiction texts about different festivals, such as Diwali and Christmas, as well as using Atlases to look at significant places around the world. The children have loved getting creative using different materials and using their bodies to travel safely in different ways during PE lessons.













A highlight of our Autumn term was definitely the children's fantastic performance of 'Little Blue Star' which they performed to the school, parents and teachers. They were clear, confident and sang

beautifully and everyone who watched was so proud of them!

In Maths, the children have been using comparative language such as longer than, shorter than, greater than, less than and equal to to talk about amounts and lengths. They have also created different types of repeating patterns and spoken about 1 more and 1 less than numbers to 10. We have been encouraging the children to think about different ways to make amounts and the children have been making fantastic progress with this!

YEAR 1—DONALDSON



What a brilliant Autumn Term in Year One! The children have had a busy and exciting start to Key Stage One and have settled in very well.

In English, the children have done extremely well, and have enjoyed all of the stimulus books we have used for our writing. We have read the books: 'The Everywhere Bear', 'Dinosaurs and other prehistoric creatures' and 'The Jolly Postman' and written a variety of different genres of writing.

In Maths, the children have

learnt about number and place value, addition and subtraction and shape. The children have enjoyed using manipulatives to support their learning.

In DT, the children have thoroughly enjoyed learning about sliders and movements and have created their own moving story book.



In Art, we have been learning about printmaking and have created simple prints. We have been learning about rubbings and used charcoal and crayons to create simple rubbings of things in our environment.

Well done, to all of you and you are all doing very well! You have had an excellent start to Year One and we look forward to the rest of the year with you all. Finally, the Everywhere Bear has enjoyed visiting your homes, and looks forward to going home with the rest of you.

YEAR 2—GREY

We've been really impressed with the start Grey class has had to Year Two.

In English, the children worked hard over the weeks looking at alliteration, prepositions and noun phrases in preparation for their own version of our class book, 'The Black Hat'. We have also looked at an alternative storytelling of Rapunzel and thought about how we can defeat the wicked witch and what potions we could create. What imaginative writers we have in Year Two!

In Maths, we have been learning about 2-D and 3-D shapes. We have learnt about faces, edges and vertices and are using this vocabulary in our explanations. We have also been learning about the difference between regular and irregular shapes.

This half term in **Geography**, we have been exploring the United Kingdom. We found out about the four countries that make up the UK, their capital cities, the waters that surround the UK as well as our place in the world. We also created collages of different physical features that you would find in the UK, such as rivers, mountains and cliffs.

In Art, we have been learning to print and we have produced our own monprints using carbon paper.

In DT, that has been linked to our Science learning, we have looked at different materials we could use to bend and twist to create our own chairs for

Baby Bear. We had lots of fun experimenting with what shapes to use to make sure the chair was strong and stable. Look at our brilliant creations!

YEAR 3—ZEPHANIAH

Stone Age has finally come to an end and what a long time period it has been! However, the children have enjoyed learning about the three time periods within the Stone Age before we moved on to the Bronze and Iron Age. Many of the things we take for granted today, all originate from the Stone Age! We finished our Autumn topic leaning all about Stonehenge and the children had to give their own ideas of what Stonehenge was used for.

We have also completed our **Science** topic all about rocks and soils and the children have created their own fossils. The children were fascinated to learn that a new fossil had recently been discovered in Dorset- it was a great way to end our topic.







It was lovely to see all the children taking part in **Christmas Jumper Day** and the children had fun wearing them too. They had a wonderful time talking to each other about their tops.

Well done to all the children who took part in the **Autumn Showcase**, as an audience, we really enjoyed it and the children had lots to say about it when they went back to class.

Celebrating differences has been the theme of our **PSHE** sessions and the children have role-played various scenarios over the term- I think we might have some buddy actors and actresses in the class! Our topic has opened up lots of discussion about who we are as people, things we like and dislike and how we can make the world a better place. Learning to respect ourselves and each other, as well as showing kindness to all.

In PE, we have been dancing and both myself and Mrs King have been very impressed by the creativity of the children's dances! They have tried hard to keep in time with the beat and only last week performed their own dance whilst working within the parameters of the criteria given. The children have worked

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YEAR 5—MORPURGO

What a busy half term it has been in Year Five!

In English, we have been reading 'Journey to Jo'burg'. We have found it to be inspiring, as well as emotional, to learn what life was like for people living in South Africa during Apartheid.

In Geography, we have been learning about where South Africa is in the world and the geography within South Africa, through it's physical and human features. We have learnt how the land is used in South Africa and how that differs in rural and urban areas. We have learnt about how the land is used in a city and how it changes. We have also learnt how Fairtrade supports farmers and has increased the amount of productive farm land there is in South Africa.

In PSHE, we have embraced the theme of 'Celebrating Difference' as this links with our English learning. We have discussed how wonderful it is that we are so different and how we have different cultures to each other.

In Maths, we have focused much of the half term's learning on Fractions. We have learnt how to find equivalent fractions, which has helped us to add and subtract fractions, mixed numbers and improper fractions. It has been amazing to see so much progress in Maths!

In PE, we have been learning how to play Tag Rugby and we have learnt how to attack and defend using the tags. We have been focused on one of the key



rugby rules - run forwards, pass backwards. At the end of the half term, we had a house tournament to earn extra house points for our houses!

Year Five have worked really hard this half term and we look forward to all our new learning in Spring!

In P.E, the children have been creating their own gymnastics sequences with their classmates and were confident to share their work with their peers. They have also been working hard in **Science** and have been busy planning and carrying out a range of investigations to test how the distance between an object and light source affects the size of a shadow.
